

Teaching Model Regrets - Episode 397

For existing multisite churches, think through the following questions to assess what is working or not working about your current model.

1. Is there consistency between campuses?
2. Are campus leaders asking to do things differently at their location?
3. If we plan to launch more campuses, does it feel like we have a model we can scale?
4. Are we overstaffed (divide total attendance by 112 to see how many FTEs should be on our team)?

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
